The museum will host gatherings on the third Monday of the month, beginning June 15<sup>th</sup> from 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. to offer Greater Danbury seniors an opportunity to discuss local history.

We especially look forward to talking with attendees about our next exhibit, Focus on the Fifties, opening June 13, 2015. Our first session will involve collecting and sharing information, stories and remembrances related to 1950's Danbury," stated Brigid Guertin, Executive Director of museum and Danbury City Historian.

Oral history projects, roundtable discussions, family history research assistance and help with identifying unmarked photographs in the archives are a few of the activities slated.
